### Day 01: Takamatsu City

From Takamatsu Station, you begin a day of cultural and artistic exploration in this charming little Shōwa Era city.

First, you will visit the gallery of George Nakashima, a Japanese American furniture designer, and architect. In his former workspace, you will be able to see some of the most highly regarded pieces of his work.

After lunch, you will then visit the outdoor gallery of artist Isamu Noguchi. Here you can ponder what art truly is as you contemplate his works.

The end of the day will have you enjoy the sweeping scenery from the lofty mountain temples of Yakuriji and Yashimaji. From each of these, you will be able to enjoy the deep blue of the Setō Inland Sea, the green of the mountains, and the charming urban scenery of this unique city.

For the rest of the evening, you will be able to explore the city freely as you please and we hope that you will take advantage of the quirky yet colorful nightlife of this city.

## Day 02: Ohenro Course

In the morning you will be driven to Kappa Dōjō, a Zen temple high in the Goshikidai Mountains. Here you will experience “zazen” style sitting meditation in the same manner as the monks of this temple. Afterward, you will then share a very traditional style meal alongside the monks who will instruct you on the proper Zen way to finish a meal.

After this, your day will be spent among the lofty peaks walking the ancient pilgrimage trails that snake through the mountain range. This will take you through the temples of Shiromineji and Negoroji—both rich in myth, lore, and more sweeping views of the surrounding countryside.
